News from The Hermitage

The Samaritan Program is an integral part of the mission of Pinnacle Living which sup-

plies financial assistance to residents unable to meet the full cost of services. During this past year \$1,036,610 was provided in benevolent support to residents in United Methodist Homes. Trinity has again been recognized as one of the top congregations to help in this way. A great deal of appreciation goes to our members who have been loyal in supporting the program.

The Hermitage Bazaar and Bake Sale was a huge success in October. Many thanks go to those who contributed baked goods and other items for the sale. Through these sales we are able to enrich the lives of residents by purchasing items that are needed. A recent decision was to use funds to buy up to six Coffee Servers, refurbish the piano bench in the Social Hall, and to purchase 2 sets of crowd control stanchions as well as an additional wall mounted unit. The Country Store will not be open in November, but will open again on December 1, from 10:30 AM-2:30 PM.

How is Your Thermostat?

Having worked in public school buildings for 31 years, I know firsthand the challenges of trying to satisfy everyone's personal thermostat in a classroom or building, and I can say the same for my last six years of trying to control Trinity's cooling and heating. Attempting to satisfy everyone's personal thermostat in a building is impossible. One of the challenges we have at Trinity is that our building was constructed in phases. Those phases of construction took into consideration needs for Heating, Ventilating, and Air Conditioning (HVAC), and the systems that are in place are adequate. That doesn't mean these systems always cooperate.

The Trustees have directed Colonial Webb, the company we contract with to maintain our HVAC systems, to conduct a full assessment of our current HVAC equipment. This request is grounded in developing a plan for our future needs including a schedule for replacing older equipment. Additionally, this will include a review of the controls and pneumatic systems that are part of our HVAC as well.

As we prepare to transition from summer to fall to winter, our Virginia rollercoaster weather can make keeping a building comfortable even more challenging. However, if you have a concern about the building temperature, e-mail Bill Pike: bpike@trinityumc.net.

Church of the Resurrection: Leadership Institute

On the afternoon of Tuesday, September 26, a team of 14 including Trinity program staff and laity departed for a three day Leadership Institute at the Church of Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas. Led by Adam Hamilton, Church of the Resurrection is quite a story from its humble beginnings in a funeral home to a now state of the art facilities in what was once a cornfield.

For three days our team attended a variety of workshops and sessions led by Church of the Resurrection Staff and a diverse group of presenters who have expertise in a number of areas related to all things church. Eight large group sessions were presented and a sampling of the topics ranged from Growing Prayer Life of Leaders and Congregations, Reaching and Engaging Emerging Generations, and Seven Stages of Church Life Cycle.

Near the conclusion of each session, Adam Hamilton served as a moderator taking the time to interact with the presenters about key concepts and asking helpful questions. We also had the privilege of hearing Pastor Hamilton speak on a variety of topics including a closing session on Friday afternoon that he co-hosted with Tom Berlin titled "Uniting Methodists."

Attending the conference, clearly gave our team much to ponder. We benefitted from conversation with other conference attendees, and the session topics generated much conversation and discussion among our team. Each of us had a level of curiosity about how a new idea might be molded for use at Trinity.

REFO 500 at Trinity

On October 1, Trinity marked the 500th anniversary of the Reformation with a Forum in Trinity Hall. After opening remarks about the historical background to the Protestant Reformation by Dr. Louis Cei, who teaches the McClure Bible Study class, three speakers, a Lutheran, a Presbyterian and a Catholic offered comments on what the Reformation meant for their faiths, then and now. Pastor Larry Lenow made closing remarks. Here are excerpts from their presentations:

Dr. Cei said the Reformation encompassed four areas: reform of Church morals, reform of Church doctrine, a new approach to the relationship between Church and State, and a shift in the economic order from control by the Church to capitalism and market forces. The key doctrinal dispute was over whether the Bible or Church traditions would be the authority for moral and theological issues.

Rev. William Van O'Linda, a retired Lutheran clergyman, asserted that Martin Luther was indispensable to the Reformation. Luther was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures. He was "captivated with an extraordinary ardor" for understanding Paul in Romans. Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God, but in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear. Luther wrote that when he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith. I felt that I was altogether born again." What Luther discovered was the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy through Christ.

Next, Dr. Stanley Skreslet, an ordained Presbyterian (Reformed) minister and a professor at Union Presbyterian Seminary, stated that the Reformation was not a single historical movement, but a series of multiple Reformations. Dr. Skreslet listed some features of the Reformed tradition: first, Biblicist or using the Bible as the basis of Church life; next, a balance between ordained and lay leadership; and finally an internationalist approach to evangelism.

Deacon Tom Mullen, Director of Catholic life and a Professor at the University of Richmond said that having a Catholic come to talk about the Reformation is a little like going to your ex-girlfriend's wedding. Sure, I'm happy that you're happy, but maybe a little sad, too. What might have been if we had listened a little better?

The Roman Catholic Church of course recognizes the Holy Spirit in the life and work of other Christian traditions. The sadness of our separation cannot stop the Spirit from working within all of us in diverse ways. We certainly have differences, and those differences matter. But we have much more in common, than perhaps most of us think.

In the campus ministry setting in which he works, young people are hungry for the Gospel and to serve, and they are less interested in denominational differences. His Sunday Mass attracts Christian college students from many traditions, in part because of the convenience of Mass on campus, and in part because of community--friends with whom they can worship and serve. We should continue to find new ways to minister together, to know the Lord and to make Him known, and to serve a world that is hurting and hungry for the good news of Jesus Christ.

Pastor Lenow closed by asking, "Is the Reformation over?" He concluded that no, the Reformation continues. We should stress what unites us rather than doctrinal issues that divide us. He said that 30 years ago when he was at the world's leading Methodist theology school, Duke Divinity, a number of professors who were not Methodists taught him. So, today, we are closer to unity than ever before, but must strive for even greater ecumenism and do so with reconciliation and humility in mind.

Drop off boxes will be in the Welcome Center on Sunday, November 5 just waiting to be filled up. Please don't forget!

Literacy Team Program at Oak Grove Elementary

Literacy Teams target the lowest performing students in Grades K and First. Volunteers work individually with two students from 9:20-10:50 AM for the morning program or 2:15-3:15 PM in the afternoon. Volunteers use selected 'sight word' flash cards, alphabet recognition cards, early reader books, games, and other tools to help students gain confidence and fluency in reading. Volunteers also fill out a weekly report form on each student. Now in its 4th year the Literacy Team data reveals a huge difference in the selected students' ability to score over the benchmark level in reading, not to mention the value of the personal effect of working one-on-one with a caring adult for an entire school year.
