His passion is for leveling the playing field for the children he serves.

A Week Under the Stars



"Making a Difference in a Child's Life" is something we try our best to do for our children and grandchildren.
One of the truly outstanding experiences that Trinity

membership has afforded me is participating in All God's Children Camp. Imagine what life is like for a child affected by parental incarceration. Typically, he or she lives with extended family members or just one parent. AGCC Mentors, ages 17 and up, spend the week with one or two campers providing supervision, companionship, and compassion. Mentors agree to maintain contact with the child after camp is over. Mentors arrive by 9 am on Sunday, June 18, and depart after clean-up around 4 pm on Friday, June 23. A \$20 background check is the only mentor fee for the week.

Since 1998, Bishop Joe Pennell instituted the All God's Children's Camp as a part of the Virginia Conference Initiative on Children and Poverty. Imagine beginning the day with breakfast, Sonrise Worship, three activities, lunch, rest time, three more camp activities, dinner, evening activity, and devotions followed by bedtime. Camp fun includes swimming, nature, crafts, Bible study, boating, fishing, ropes course, and much more. The gift of your time can change the compass of a child's life. Last summer at Camp Overlook we hiked up to a waterfall and experienced a wildly fun Jr. Olympics including a mattress race and mud slide. Metro Richmond campers ages 7-11 will attend Camp Chanco on the James near Williamsburg. Trinity sends a mentor team each year so children can attend camp.
