"To God Be the Glory:" Fanny Crosby, The Queen of Gospel Song Writers

As I was planning this article, I wanted to focus on Christmas. I started to look for records of special Christmas services or events planned by the Women's Home Missionary Society or the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. What I found was not all that surprising. Methodist women in the late nineteenth century and early twentieth century did many of the same things we do today. They took up collections for charity. They assisted with the planning of special worship services, helped coordinate events to feed the poor, and took an opportunity to commemorate the successes of various missionary programs. Most importantly, they spent the season sharing stories of God's love and celebrating Jesus's birth.

These are all lovely Christmas traditions, but I wanted to find something more specific to share for my article. Since I could not find a major event to write on, I turned to my favorite things about the Christmas season. My first thought was the music!

This is the season of Lessons and Carols, Christmas pageants, and endless holiday songs on the radio. It sets the mood for the season. The music is festive and reverent, jolly and spiritual. With music in mind, I went back to the internet and found Fanny Crosby.



Fanny Crosby (1820-1915) is a poet, lyricist, and mission worker. She is one of the most prolific hymnist in history, having written more than 8,000 hymns and gospel songs. It is impossible to know how many hymns she wrote, because she published using over 100 pseudonyms! What is also remarkable about Crosby is that she was blind. At eight years old, she wrote, "...I might not have sung hymns to the Praise of God if I had been distracted by the beautiful and interesting things about me." Through the course of her life, she certainly used her gifts to praise the Lord.

Though Crosby was not born Methodist, she eventually joined a Methodist Episcopal Church. She became very involved with missions work. According to scholars, she wanted to be remembered for her service not for her musical skills. I have not yet found evidence that she was involved with the Women's Home Missionary Society, but she would have agreed with the goals of the organization. Crosby gave her time and gifts to organizations that

provided local outreach, becoming involved with rescue missions in New York City. She was dedicated to community and used her music to uplift those in need.

Crosby was a household name in the late-nineteenth century. Today "To God Be the Glory" and "Blessed Assurance" are probably two of her best known hymn. Below is just a selection from each:

"To God Be the Glory"

To God be the glory, great things He hath done; So loved He the world that He gave us His Son, Who yielded His life an atonement for sin, And opened the life gate that all may go in. Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,
Let the earth hear His voice!
Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,
Let the people rejoice!
O come to the Father, through Jesus the Son,
And give Him the glory, great things He hath done.

...

"Blessed Assurance"

Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine!

O what a foretaste of glory divine!

Heir of salvation, purchase of God,

Born of His Spirit, washed in His blood.

This is my story, this is my song, Praising my Savior all the day long; This is my story, this is my song, Praising my Savior all the day long.

Her hymns are beautiful, and they speak to her dedication to the Church and her faith. These hymns were Crosby's way of worshipping our Lord. Moreover, she guides us, the congregation, in finding the words to speak that reflect what we hold in our hearts.

Crosby continues to be celebrated as a brilliant composer and hymnist. She was posthumously inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1975 and is referred to as the "Queen of Gospel Song Writers."

This Christmas think of Fanny Crosby and celebrate in the sounds of the Lord. Let the music fill you with the Christmas spirit. Have a blessed holiday season! We'll pick up with our history of the United Methodist Women in January.
