3. A Grief Observed

Facilitator. Carol Wampler Date: Jan. 5 - Jan. 26 (4 weeks)

When a loved one dies, or when we experience other types of loss, how do we survive the pain? And do we have difficulty maintaining our faith in a loving and merciful God in the face of our sadness and suffering? C. S. Lewis lost his beloved wife to cancer in 1960. In response, Lewis wrote a personal journal, freely confessing his pain, rage, and struggle to sustain his faith. In the course of writing his journal, Lewis finds his way back to life and faith. His journal was published as *A Grief Observed*, and this book has reportedly offered solace and insight to countless readers worldwide. This is not a scholarly study, but rather an opportunity to reflect, to speak, and to listen, in the company of caring and supportive friends. Books available from the church office. Participants are asked to read Chapter 1 prior to the first meeting.

4. The Bible as Literature

Facilitator: Teresa Given **Date**: Jan. 5 - Jan. 26 (4 weeks)

Participants in this study will experience the Bible as the inspired word of God as well as a masterpiece of storytelling! We will study the Old Testament Book of Ruth as a work of literature. We will follow characters, look at the influence of setting, ponder symbols and conflicts, as well as examine other literary elements as they pertain to the story of Ruth and Naomi. We will also look at possible themes and how they influence our lives as Christians.

Winter Weather Decisions

Decisions for closing our building related to winter weather are tricky. Basically, we follow the closing announcements from Henrico County Public Schools. For example, if

schools close early or are on a delayed opening, Trinity's opening and closing times are adjusted. If Henrico schools are closed, Trinity will be closed, and this would include all day and evening events. Our ability to re-open the building after a winter weather event depends upon how quickly we can clear our sidewalks and parking lots. If we can safely get people on to our grounds and into our building, then Trinity might return to normal operations quicker than the school system. From the Trustees

As we move ahead into this New Year, it is good time to take both a look back and look ahead from the perspective of the Trustees.

Back in 2018, Trinity's Facilities Task Force shared the results of their extensive look at the condition and use of Trinity's facilities, as well as conducted one of the most comprehensive surveys of Trinity members to solicit input on priorities. Soon thereafter, the Unstuck consultation was completed. Perhaps not surprisingly, when it came to facilities, the findings were generally consistent. Both efforts noted that priorities included youth (Kids and Students) as well as improving the new member and visitor experience.

With those priorities identified, the Trustees began to assess how best to move forward. Based on architectural study by Huff-Morris architects, it was determined an opportunity for dedicated space for Students, including a new office for the Director of Student Ministries, could be realized by converting the Mastin room and operations office. The Trustees, with support from Church Council and the Trinity Foundation, began moving forward with having the plans for this space fully developed. In addition, the Trustees identified the installation of new flooring and painting for the main hallways adjacent to the Sanctuary and leading to the church office as another priority, aimed at helping improve our first impression. Last, but not least, working with the Connect Committee, developing a plan for new signage, both inside and out was also undertaken. These areas of focus were approved in the Spring of 2019.

Then, as is so often the case, we had to pivot. The piston shaft for the Trinity Hall elevator failed and required significant repairs. The condition of the roofs over Trinity Hall and a portion of the education wing reached a point where a replacement could not be put off any longer. Then, just when it seemed things were calming down, lightning struck. Literally. While covered by property insurance, significant staff and volunteer time went into working through repairs to the HVAC systems.

As the fall began, the Trustees continued to focus on the plans for new Student space, hallway work, and signage. Though they may seem like simple projects, each has presented its own challenges. As 2019 drew to a close, the paint work was substantially complete, the installation of new flooring has been contracted, and plans for the first phase of new signage are nearly complete.

Looking ahead, the next major project being considered is renovation of the Chapel. This project is being considered for a number of reasons. First, the Facilities Task Force identified the Chapel as an underutilized space. In addition, there are existing conditions within the Chapel that need to be addressed soon, regardless of use, including the ceiling, lighting, and flooring. Last, but certainly not least, the Chapel has been identified as the best location for the new Kids Church, part of Trinity's new Sunday worship schedule designed to appeal to kids and young families. The Chapel's proximity to the Sanctuary provides critical easy drop-off and pickup for parents. Although the final design has not been completed, it is anticipated the existing pews will be removed and replaced with movable seating that will allow for a variety of configurations, based on the type of worship service or activity taking place.

Since its inception on Forest Avenue, this facility has served our church and its surrounding community well. Every generation of congregations tied to Trinity at some point in their journey has encountered change. Think about the move from the city to this plot. If you look at the construction improvements made in this facility from the 60s and beyond, each of those was spurred by growth. As we look to grow again, we must have the courage to make some changes. Those changes in program and the building are interwoven.

Moving forward, we also hope to support efforts to continue the new flooring, painting, and signage throughout the building, using consistent materials and color schemes. The Church has been fortunate to have some great volunteers help with efforts to date and there will be more opportunities in the future.

We hope you will join our continued prayers for the future of Trinity.

Mission Pilgrimage to Korea 2020

An eight-day spiritual pilgrimage in South Korea

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 22 - WEDNESDAY, APRIL 29, 2020



The Mission Pilgrimage to Korea is designed for the active clergy and lay leaders of The United Methodist Church to experience the missions planted by American missionaries a century ago in Korea, as well as spiritual richness and prayer as the foundation of personal and collective spiritual renewal.

This pilgrimage will explore:

- how American missionaries planted seeds for the growing Korean churches
- how the spiritual awakening and prayer movement started in Korea
- how Korean Christianity has influenced the community and society
- what are new challenges and drives for global missions.

This event qualifies for 1.5 Continuing Education Units.

The Mission Pilgrimage to Korea will take place in Incheon, South Korea, where Henry Appenzeller, the first Methodist missionary to Korea, arrived on Easter Sunday in 1885. The participants will visit the places where missions started, schools and hospitals were built, and people have gathered into the churches, as well as the places where missions continue. You will also experience cultures and dynamics of new and old in Korea, and you will visit one of the unification observatories between the borders of South and North.

Room and board will be provided by the Bupyeong Methodist Church in Incheon, Korea for the duration of the trip.

PARTICIPANTS WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE COST OF AIRFARE, TRAVEL INSURANCE, AND PERSONAL EXPENSES.

Calendar Year-end Contributions

IRS Code 10170A-1(b) states that only funds received by December 31, 2019 **or** postmarked by December 31, 2019 may be counted as 2019 contributions. The date of receipt or the postmark is the key to determining the year of receipt. Thus, if someone hand carries a check to the church on January 2, 2020 that is dated December 31, 2019 it is a **2020** gift according to IRS regulations. But, if a check arrives by mail at the church on January 2, 2020 and it is postmarked December 31, 2019 and the check is dated December 31, 2019 or before, it is a **2019** gift.
