

#### The Table

"The Table" is a worship and fellowship gathering centered around dinner and communion on the first Wednesday of each month at 6 PM. We begin the even-

ing as one family—kids, students, and adults together—for a time of singing and prayer before sharing a meal and celebrating communion. Kids and students then enjoy fellowship together, while adults engage in meaningful discussion around "the Table." We finish up at about 7:15.

This "come as you are" gathering, is a space to connect with others and experience church in a more casual and interactive way, faithful to the tradition of Jesus' disciples sharing meals together and growing together as friends and family.



## **EASTER**

At this point in the school year, life is running at full speed. Spring sports, school projects, \$10 for this, \$10 for that—and right in the middle of it all comes one of the most important holidays of all, Easter.

Easter is when we remember Jesus's death and resurrection, when our sin was paid for by His sacrifice, and the hope of a new life was given with His empty tomb.

It's not something we want to just get through. We want to pause long enough to honor this momentous event, reflect on what it means for our faith, and then celebrate it with our families. Here are a few simple ways to make the most of Easter as a family.

**GROW YOUR OWN EASTER GRASS.** Avoid plastic grass sticking to your bare feet for the next month by picking up a container of wheat berries and growing your own Easter grass. New growth and the beauty of spring is a good reminder of the message of Easter—of the resurrection, and of our new life in Christ. Look up instructions on how to grow wheatgrass and grow it right in your kid's Easter basket. (Bonus: wheatgrass is a healthy addition to smoothies!)

**PLAY THE SHELL CRACK GAME.** Make a dozen or so hard-boiled eggs. (Go the extra mile and decorate them as a family!) Have each person choose an egg and face off against another family member. The goal is to smash the small end of one egg against an opponent's. One will crack, while the other won't. The person with the unbroken shell moves on to the next round!

**EGG THE NEIGHBORS.** The biggest thing we can do to honor the cross is to go and love others. Show your neighbors some love this Easter by making a basket of Easter goodies. Include a slip of paper that says, "You've been egged!" Then, ring the neighbor's doorbell, leave the basket by the door, and run!

**MAKE PEEP S'MORES.** This one speaks for itself! Heat source + graham crackers + chocolate + Peeps = a family tradition you'll look forward to all year. Because the most fun way to celebrate anything is by making delicious things to eat—together!

**HAVE AN EGG HUNT AT NIGHT.** Snap some glow sticks and carefully place them in a few plastic Easter eggs along with a Scripture verse or words of encouragement (you may need to tape them shut). Hide the eggs at sunset and wait until it's fully dark to do your glow-in-the-dark egg hunt! After they've been retrieved, enjoy some sweet treats and have everyone read their slips of paper.

A NOT SO GOOD FRIDAY. Good Friday, the Friday before Easter, is when we recognize the day Jesus died on the cross. As a family, gather and tell stories about when something was really bad, even hopeless, but the end result was better than you thought. Share how the disciples thought things were hopeless, that Jesus was dead, but then He was resurrected. Then celebrate by doing something better than your family expects with a surprise dessert.

**FOR OLDER KIDS.** As a family, read through the final days of Jesus in the Bible. (Read Matthew 21–28; Mark 14–16; Luke 22–24; and/or John 18–20.) Have each person read a chapter aloud. If the story is familiar, challenge everyone to notice something new about the story that they didn't see before and share it. Also, talk about what the story means to you personally.

#### The Table

A group of people about 60, including children, gathered on the first Wednesday of March in the evening as the first Table. "The Table" is an informal church family dinner with acoustic music and singing, scripture reading, a brief meditation, and communion, followed by meaningful discussion for adults and youth and fun activities for kids.



After we spent much time on discernment, including praying, brainstorming, sharing hopes and dreams, we wanted to focus on Acts 2:43-47, which gave us a snapshot of the early Christian church. As we shared the 2020 ministry vision for Trinity, we believed that Worship, Spiritual Growth, and Community Life would be needed for being faithful to the authentic and biblical church model.

The Table has been a blessing because it offers a time of worship, growth, and community life. At the first gathering of The Table, we worshiped our Lord with praises and thanksgiving and shared what it means to gather around a table.

Tables are various in terms of purposes, sizes, and shapes, but what they are in common is that they are meant to be used as a place of gathering. They help us build a community. Family, friends, and coworkers sit, eat, work, and share conversations that bring joys, sorrows, hopes, and worries. Eating is the most basic human function that everyone shares. A table allows us to have a space to eat the food that creates a basic level of connection. A table reflects a life.

In the Bible, there are many table stories. Abraham invites three strangers and has a meal with them. God commands to sit together, eat, and remember the night of Passover. Jesus celebrates at the wedding at Cana, sits with people, sinners, and tax collectors. He says to Zacchaeus, "Come down. I must stay at your house today," and Zacchaeus hurries down and is happy to welcome him. Jesus sits with the Samaritan woman, offering the living water, and feed the five thousand. In one of the parables, when the prodigal son returns, there is a great feast.

The Table where Jesus sits with his disciples and shares the bread, and the wine is one of the most tangible signs of the community that Jesus invites. It is a visual sign of God's grace, love, and welcome. Jesus invites us to his Table by saying, "This is my body which is given for you. This is my blood of the new covenant poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins."

What does it mean for you to have a place at the Table right now? What is the Lord leading you to do in response to the Table?

With this situation of covid-19, of course, we are suspended our gatherings until further notice, but would you share your stories? What are the stories of your memories and experiences around the Table?

### **Answering the Call – Stitchers Style!**

We wanted you to know that the Trinity Stitchers are busy making cloth masks for factory workers in Hopewell. The call went out Monday afternoon from Louise Girvin: "Our son, Andy, is plant manager for a large industrial plant in Hopewell. His plant is considered "essential" since they supply the material that goes into fertilizer used by farmers. One of his biggest concerns right now is keeping his workers healthy — and keeping the plant running. A huge task! His workers wear masks when operating the machinery. As you know, all masks (of the type he normally uses) are being diverted to the healthcare industry. Hence, he is running short of the disposable masks and needs to consider alternatives. One is to make reusable masks; hence, my involvement (since I'm the only one in the family who knows how to use a sewing machine!). Once he gets all his "ducks in a row," he would like 50-100 masks (with perhaps more later). I need more hands than just mine to get them made in the short amount of time he's looking at." ## 2020 General Conference Postponed

The 2020 Session of General Conference, the worldwide United Methodist legislative body has been postponed due to the Coronavirus pandemic. The March 23 announcement came from the Commission on the General Conference. The commission will work towards scheduling a date in 2021 to take place in Minneapolis, MN. "As we looked at the complex issues that we will need to navigate to reschedule the event and the lack of options available, it does not appear feasible to plan for 2020." Said Kim Simpson, chair of the Commission. "These issues include the undetermined length of the pandemic, uncertainty around travel bans in different areas of the world, delays in processing visas due to government and business closures and other questions."

### **Update from the Finance Committee**

The COVID-19 virus has impacted all of our lives in many ways. First and foremost, we hope that all members of our Trinity family are healthy, safe, and continuing to find spiritual enrichment through our great church. Our committee met recently to discuss the potential impact of the temporary church shutdown on Trinity's finances. Here are a few things that we would like to communicate to the congregation:

- Tithes and Offerings Please continue to support our church with your tithes and offerings, as you are able, during our temporary shutdown. Our expenses continue, even though we will not have a chance to pass the offering plates. We encourage everyone to continue giving in your typical pattern/frequency via online methods, or by mailing checks to the church office at 903 Forest Avenue, Henrico, VA 23229.
- Online Giving if you do not give online already, this is a good opportunity to switch! Trinity has several ways to give online currently, including ACH, e-check, and credit card. We are also investigating new ways to automate giving as well, including Zelle and PayPal. These are all easy, safe, and consistent ways to provide your gifts to Trinity. - Apportionments our committee voted to temporarily suspend monthly apportionment payments to the Conference, until we determine if Trinity will be financially impacted during this time. While we intend to pay our apportionments in full by their due date (December 31, 2020), we want to be sure that funding is available to meet our essential expenses, most notably our priority to fund payroll for our clergy and staff.
- Capital Projects Trinity remains committed to investing in long-term capital projects to grow our church and fulfill our mission. Our trustees are moving forward with several exciting projects, which are largely funded outside of our operating budget. Major capital projects will continue to be subject to church council approval, and will be evaluated in the context of our overall financial health.

### Congratulations Dr. Jim McCullough

Jim P. McCullough, Jr., a longstanding member of Trinity UMC and the Contemporary Class (48 years), just published a memoir describing his toxic growing-up years and the major players who helped him mature and grow up. Subsequently, he became a clinical psychologist and spent 47 years as a clinical psychology faculty member in two universities doing diagnostic and treatment research with chronic depression and personally treating 450 chronically depressed patients. He has developed the only empirically validated psychological method available in this country and abroad to treat the chronically depressed disorder – a condition now labeled Persistent Depressive Disorder. The book title is Swimming Upstream: A Story about Becoming Human and the book was published in January, 2020 by Dorrance Publishing Company, Pittsburgh, PA.
