### Pastor's Corner

"But those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." Isaiah 40:31

Boy, I sure hope so. As I've mentioned from the pulpit a number of times, waiting and patience have never been my long suit. In point of fact, the truth is rather the opposite. I like to see things happen (and on my schedule). I am often disappointed and frustrated.

I know that many of you are wondering, "When will we reopen? When will we begin in-person worship?" While I can't give you a specific answer, I would like to let you know how things are unfolding.

Last week the Bishop released Protocols for a Plan of Return. These protocols are mandatory for all Virginia United Methodist Churches. Our protocols are in phases mirroring the executive orders of the Governor, *but* they are also more conservative. I want to say that I believe this is appropriate. Jesus commanded us to love our neighbors and loving our neighbors must mean protecting not only the most vulnerable of our own congregation but also the community and our health care providers as well. The Bishop and her team lifted up the Three Rules of John Wesley:

- Do no harm.
- Do good.
- Stay in love with the Lord.

What follows is my own, very incomplete, synopsis of the plan (the full Protocol is some 65 pages) with comments for Trinity. We are currently convening a Healthy Church Team (HCT) as is every Virginia UMC.

#### Phase 1. (Starting May 24)

- -Each District will have two "Pioneer Churches" that will re-open to in-person worship of no more than 25 persons and strict protocols. (Trinity is not a Pioneer Church.)
- -All other churches will continue online or virtual worship.

#### Phase 2 (Start date determined by the Bishop. I personally would not expect this before mid-June.)

-Churches may reopen to in-person worship with strict Protocols that include (in part):

- No more than 50 persons in worship.
- Reservations must be made ahead of time.
- Maintain 6 ft. Social distancing.
- No singing. (No congregational singing, no choir, no soloist.)
- Mask worn at all times (including clergy)
- No children under age 7 present.
- No fellowship time or space.

#### Phase 3 (Determined by the Bishop.)

A "New Normal" aligned with prevailing state guidelines.

Friends, my purpose here is to give you a sense of where we are and how we will proceed. I know you will have questions and frankly I probably do not have the answers. We will have to decide how and when we move forward under such limitations. For now, I am so appreciative of the way we as a church have responded and carry on in the midst of this pandemic. Further, let me also say that the Church of Jesus Christ has been through much worse in the past (the Roman persecution, the Black Plague, the Spanish Inquisition, the Thirty Years War, just to name a few.) We will carry on. We will love our neighbors. We will proclaim the Good News to all who will hear it. We will be the Church. Be strong. Keep the faith. And the grace and peace of Jesus the Christ be with us all.



## **Update From The Trustees**

In the January edition of The Window, we shared with you an update on a number of projects related to our church facilities. Most notable among these was the renovation of the Mastin Room and adjacent space to create a home for our Student Ministries. As part of the design and bidding process for this work, the Trustees worked with the project architect (Jim Byerly – Huff Morris Architects) and winning general contractor (Century Construction) and determined it would be cost effective to add a renovation of the Trinity Hall corridor and restrooms to the project scope.

During the last year, the Trustees have worked collaboratively with the Trinity staff, Church Council, the Finance Committee, and Trinity Foundation to develop a plan of support. Funding for this project will come from two grants from the Trinity Foundation, a significant gift from an anonymous Trinity family, and the property reserve account. None of funding comes from the general operating budget.

In the coming weeks, we expect to finalize the construction contract, secure permits, and proceed with this work. Now, perhaps more than ever, our Church leadership groups believe it is essential to invest in our Students.

Additionally, you may have noticed the signs that identify the Welcome Center and Sanctuary. With the help of the Connect Committee, we are moving forward with installation of new signs throughout the building. The first phase includes interior signs, with new directional signs for the parking lots and walkways to follow in a second phase.

The Trustees want to thank everyone involved in setting the stage for these exciting improvements to our church home, from the initial work of identifying priorities, to developing project plans, and securing sources of funding. We are especially grateful for the financial support from the Foundation and the gift from the family, that are making these projects possible.

## Did You Know This About the Trinity Foundation?

The Trinity Foundation is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt foundation addressing needs outside of the church operating budget. There are a number of funds that make up the Foundation's assets. Some are designated for specific purposes, while others are for general use. You may be familiar with the college scholarship funds, Dillard Forum, and Friends of Barnabas, but there are many other great causes the Trinity Foundation supports. For instance, a new initiative leveraged the Foundation's support to substantially increase the 2019 Advent Offering for United Methodist Family Services. The Foundation matched up to \$5,000 in donations. A resulting \$28,000 was raised, eclipsing last year's total by more than \$12,000.

What makes these achievements possible? Your donations do. In the coming months, we'll be highlighting some of the fund allocations that are making a difference in our community.

Already in the first half of 2020, the Trinity Foundation has approved the following grant requests:

- \$500 from Goodykoontz Fund to CrossOver Healthcare Ministries The Goodykoontz Fund was established in 1993, to support missions for the poor by the C. Alfred Goodykoontz family (Jean, Alf and Claudine).
- \$300 from the Moore Fund and \$200 from the Roop Fund for Grace Inside (prison ministries)
  - o The Moore Fund was established in 2000, to support the mission of Christian prison ministry by the family of George E. Moore, Jr. (Jo Ann B. and George E. Moore, Jr.)
  - o The Ralph G. Roop Fund is a general fund established by a charitable remainder trust and bequest from his will in 2006.
- \$50,000 for the Student Center. This includes renovations of the Mastin Room, hallway, and bathroom and is in addition to \$76,000 previously awarded in Spring 2019. This support comes from funds earmarked for property and maintenance needs for the church.
- \$4,550 for live streaming broadcast cameras to enhance quality of online worship. This came from the Trinity Memorial Fund.
- \$12,500 for scholarships, which came from a variety of different funds. Stay tuned for additional details about the scholarship recipients and funds in an upcoming issue of the Trinity Window.

## Fabric – Needles - Yarn & Prayers History of our Ministry

Formed in 2006 under the leadership of Bernice Chattin and Janet Hill, the **Trinity Stitchers Ministry** mission is to provide items that convey our commitment to share God's love and grace. We have grown and evolved into a collaborative group of Christian women who stitch God's love into every item created.

The creations shared provide comfort and encouragement in various situations, reminding each recipient they are special to our family of faith. Our group of ladies certainly stays busy these days! So many items are being created each month during our workdays and all through the month. Several members knit and crochet items at home, creating beautiful scarves, hats, shawls, slippers, afghans and prayer squares.

The creativity coming from this group is amazing. Not only do we make one-of-a-kind lap quilts and prayer shawls, we sew baby slings, walker bags, decorative pillows, prayer angels from antique handkerchiefs, drawstring bags, fun tote bags and fabric bags for delivering items. We focus on individuals who are part of our church family or members of our community who may need a little uplifting during a difficult period, struggling with a disease or other illness. God's touch is ever-reaching and reminds each recipient they are united in Christian love with others.

We receive many Thank You notes from those who are remembered with an item: Recently someone who received a note and prayer square from our group shared how much the words in the card and the message of caring attached to the square meant to him. He showed the prayer square to someone who wanted to start making them to share with others too.

- Your group has brought so much love and joy to me!!!
- I cannot express to you how much I appreciate your warm, loving care to me and also to so many in the community.
- You ladies and your prayer ministries do a great work. You touch so many people in a number of ways.
- A warm hug from people who have a care and a concern about you.
- Your gifted hands and your generous hearts have touched the lives of so many people making their world a little brighter in times when their world was so dim.
- Thank you so much for your prayers and your gifts! <u>Love</u> the pocket prayer shawls (what a cool idea!). Your kindness and kind gifts have been uplifting at a time when life has been a bit harder than normal. I admire you guys and how you work through God for others! How awesome is that--and isn't that what it's all about!
- What a lovely and thoughtful and so exquisitely beautiful quilt. I can't begin to tell you how wonderful your thoughts and prayers feel! Please know how much your prayers mean to us and thank you again for the beautiful quilt.

Shared by a volunteer: A lady pulled her prayer square out of her pocket and said she didn't know who had made it, but that she carried it all the time, and pulled it out often to remind herself of the prayers being lifted up for her and the reminder that God is always there.

During this COVID-19 Pandemic, our group has embraced new projects to help our community to benefit those in need. We sewed 500 cloth masks for employees at a manufacturing plant to keep them safe and the company operational. In addition to those masks, we made 500 masks to give our families, friends and people at church. During Nurses Week in May, we distributed over 150 prayer shawl squares to nurses in our local hospitals, reminding them others appreciate their dedication and service to others. We also created more than 70 headbands for nurses at several local hospitals.

"Where two or three are gathered in my name . . . " proved so true as the Stitchers grew and prospered.

In the beginning, our ministry was small with 6 members creating 1 to 2 quilts a month. Our group has grown to 20 members and in 2019, we were able to give 107 quilts, 78 shawls and other knitted and crocheted items, 12 walker bags, 10 handkerchief angels, 25 baby slings, 281 prayer squares, and other handcrafted items not listed in this count of 500 items.

We hope to get back on our monthly schedule workday this summer. (Look for return to work information in the Trinity Connection news.) All are welcome to join us in Room 323 from 9:00 A.M. until 3:00 P.M. Please come for the entire time or any portion of the day. We have devotions at lunch which is a time of sharing concerns and joys. If you are unable to attend our group meetings, we invite you to work on projects at home. We have a vast assortment of yarn available for you to use for knit and crochet projects.
