Pastor's Corner

It occurred to me recently that some of you might feel that the church is constantly asking you for money. The reason for that is because the church *actually is* constantly asking you for money. Consider: Trinity just raised over \$33,000 for United Methodist Family Services, and thank you Trinity Foundation for the \$5,000 matching grant. Now, in the Samson Project we are asking for money for area Food Pantries. (Hey, we're just asking you for money. My donation is a little more "personal"*). We have begun *Arise*, *Shine* our annual Stewardship Campaign - absolutely critical! And, of course, Ash Wednesday is February 17, with Lent comes our Lenten/Easter Mission Offering. Hey, what gives, you ask? Fair question (which is why I'm answering it before you ask it.). Allow me to offer a few insights:

- Trinity is, and has historically been, an incredibly generous church. It's who we are, a congregation of generous people and a church that gives generously to the community.
- We trust you to know what you want to do. Of course, our tithe, our support for all the ministries of the church, is our duty. It's the offering of our first fruits to God. But after that our responses to various appeals is a matter of the spirit. No one can do and support everything, but let us all do and support something.
- If we don't ask, nothing happens.

In a phrase, follow your heart. Please faithfully support Trinity's ministries in our *Arise, Shine* campaign. We are all called to do that. It makes everything else possible. But beyond that, listen for the Spirit. Follow your heart. Be generous, but don't feel guilty or bad if you can't support everything. I hope that like me you are proud to be part of a church that is constantly asking for money because we are constantly giving it away and doing so much good. The kids at UMFS, the women and children in Trinity's apartment at CARITAS' new shelter, the people served by the food pantries can put food on their table, families in Oak Grove/Bellemeade, or the people of Honduras may never get a chance to thank you, but then there is this,



Lenten Study: The Walk

Over the last year our lives and our world have been turned upside down. So many things have changed. So many things will continue to change. Have we learned anything? Do we know what is truly important? Have we grown in our faith? Can you think of a better time to ask yourself such questions?

Our pastors have announced a church-wide Lenten Study. This

will involve a sermon series, group study and/or individual study. The resource we are using is Adam Hamilton's book, The Walk, Five Essential Practices of the Christian Life. You are encouraged to purchase a copy now so that you are ready. The sermons will use this book as a resource. That is to say, the sermon's will not be about the book, but will reference it and will assume most of the congregation is reading it. Please read the Introduction and Chapter 1 by the first sermon, February 21 and one chapter per week thereafter. Also watch for announcements of groups using this resource.

Ash Wednesday Service

Ash Wednesday is the day when we gather to begin our 40-day journey called Lent. Every year we gather to remind ourselves that we are not eternal. We confront

our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The use of ashes is a sign of mortality and repentance.

Yet, given the continuing pandemic restrictions, we have explored a different method for observing Ash Wednesday this year. For safety, we will not gather this year to mark the beginning of Lent.

So, we'll be sending ashes in a little pouch with the liturgy to you for Ash Wednesday Service. You're invited to join the Ash Wednesday worship service on February 17, 12 **PM**. The worship video will be available to watch later that day.

Caution: DO NOT MIX ASHES WITH WATER: this makes a caustic form of lye. Use olive oil instead.

New Bible Study for Lent

In Lent, Trinity will have a church-wide Bible study with a book, "The Walk," written by Adam Hamilton. Small groups are encouraged to use this book to have a Bible study during Lent. It is about five essential practices of the Christian life rooted in Jesus' own walk with God and taught throughout the New Testament. As we explore each practice, we may deepen our walk with Christ and pursue them daily in our personal and community life.

Winter Weather Decisions

Even though our building is basically closed because of the pandemic, we still must make decisions related to opening and closing based upon winter weather conditions.

The Trinity Preschool will follow closing announcements from Henrico County Public Schools. Even in this virtual environment, school systems will be making winter weather closing decisions.

For Trinity staff, community groups, and vendors who supply services to Trinity, we will basically follow Henrico County Public Schools closing announcements. However, there is a slight difference. If everything comes together properly for snow removal, Trinity might be able to reopen quicker. This all depends upon our ability to clear our sidewalks and parking lots. If we can clear these areas and safely get people into the building, then we might be able to reopen a bit earlier than a large school system.

Winter weather could also impact the broadcast of Sunday worship services. This would be true if it is too dangerous to bring in Trinity staff or if we had a power outage.
