
Re-opening Update from the Healthy Church Team

At the March 21 Church Council meeting Pastor Larry gave the following update on the current status of our reopening plans:

- Outdoor Services are planned for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday.
- Pastor Larry has asked the Church Staff to plan for Outdoor Services to continue after Easter and for indoor services to begin by June.
- Our regular livestream services will continue every week.
- Social distancing (wearing of face masks, 6 ft. distancing, etc.) in accordance with the Conference protocols will continue to be observed.

Of course, everyone should understand that all plans are contingent on the unfolding pandemic conditions. It is our hope that with the continuing vaccinations the situation will continue to improve and that Conference restrictions will soon be able to be revised and relaxed even more. Outdoor Services will resume on April 18 (after a one week break after Easter to catch our breath and see what, if any, changes we need to make for the services.) Starting indoor services in June will hopefully provide time for all adults who desire a vaccine to have one. We will initially start with one indoor service each week.

From the beginning of this crisis we have held as our guide the commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves. Our highest priorities have been to protect our congregation as well as the community while loving God. We must be concerned not only for ourselves but for the most vulnerable of the population. The Bishop and Conference Task Force are in constant contact with the Governor's Office, the Virginia Dept. of Health and follows the guidelines of the CDC. Even as we are excited about these developments, we are all impatient for more. As we enter what may be a period of regular change, let us keep at the fore of our thoughts who we are and what we are about. We are the followers of Jesus Christ. When history looks back at the Great Pandemic may we be found faithful in all our ways.




Dillard Study Group, New Study

This book provides a rich and challenging learning experience for the individual reader and makes a wonderful, six-week group study with the additional Leader Guide, DVD, and 40-day readings.

The past four years have been a whirlwind of growth, fun, and service. I will always treasure our time together; playing signs and other silly games all night at lock-ins, singing to God at the top of our lungs at retreats, and serving alongside you, in 100-degree heat, repairing people's homes, just to name a few! Watching all of you grow in your relationship with God has been the highlight of my life, and I am deeply grateful for my time walking with you along that path.

I have long felt a calling to a ministry of food, farming, and community. From my time spent in Alabama working in raised beds, to our youth group meals, to volunteering at Shalom Farms, my life has always revolved around the intersection of food and faith. God's calling on my life has been to help those who do not have the resources that they require to live an abundant life. And all though this is a difficult time of transition, the change will provide me with a new opportunity to explore my calling in our city. You know that Shalom Farms has been an opportunity for me to serve the hungry and those in need in our city. The intersection of growing food in a localized food system, and providing critical access to food in areas that are suffering from food apartheid is the perfect marriage of my passion and calling."

We wish Bryce well as he follows his call. We ask that you pray for Bryce as he begins this new chapter and that you pray for Trinity as we seek a new Director of Student Ministries.

Try composting!





An update from our French-Swahili congregation

Over the last year, many of you have asked about our French-Swahili congregation. As you might have guessed, the pandemic had an impact on them too.

A couple of families lost loved ones to assorted health issues in their home country. Also, for some of the congregation in Richmond, the pandemic impacted employment, education, and housing.

Luckily, those disruptions in Richmond were countered by your generosity. Your financial donations have allowed us to assist our French-Swahili families in their times of economic stress.

But also, like you, they have not been able to worship in person, and this has created an extra level of stress for a close-knit community. Working with some special funding, the church was able to purchase

and donate 13 Lenovo Chromebook computers to help these families.

On the afternoon of Tuesday, March 16, their congregational leader, Vianney Kayimbula, stopped by the church to pick up the Chromebooks for distribution. As soon as Vianney walked into the church office corridor, he said with lots of emotion, "Oh, how I miss my church." So do we Vianney.

The Chromebooks will enhance their opportunities to connect with each other, help to restart their worship and prayer meetings, and assist with learning the English language.

We want to thank everyone who has helped with financial donations during the last year for our French-Swahili families. You have made a real difference for them during the pandemic.


New Scouts and Spring Camping Trip
